## Skin Pendant

PAUL COCKSEGE'S LIGHTS bewitch and bedazzle. "I like them to beg the question, How do they actually work?" says the British designer, whose oeuvre includes the Styrene pendant, made from baked and conjoined Styrofoam cups, and Life 01, a table lamp that uses water and a live flower to complete its electrical circuit. Cocksedge's desire to beguile is at the root of his designs, which blend material explorations, engineering feats, and sheer alchemy. That magician's impulse has entranced supporters like fashion designer Issey Miyake and lighting legend Ingo Maurer, both of whom have staged exhibits of Cocksedge's work.

Skin, a pendant lamp introduced at this year's Milan Furniture Fair, comprises two wafer-thin, A4-size aluminum sheets that peel apart at one corner to reveal a recessed row of miniature LEDs. "In the past, we've had to use the lightbulb, which throws off a volume of light in all directions," he says. "I wanted to manufacture a lamp

that didn't have an overt technology or light source."

Cocksedge began by drawing a line on a piece of paper, thinking of the simplest way light could escape from it. From there he conceived the turned-up corner. "We could have opened it up more and made it more of a feature," he says, "but we wanted to do the smallest amount of work possible." The minimal gesture, in line with Skin's streamlined form, produces a focused, downward light. And the fixture's expansive sides? A stylish heat sink for the lamp's super-hot LEDs.

Skin—so named because Cocksedge found its prototype "kind of fleshlike, with an outside and inside"—will be available in early 2010 in several color combinations, including a mirrored exterior with a white interior and white exterior with red interior. "To have something so thin with light illuminating its surface—people's instinct is to try to understand it," he says. —JULIE TARASKA

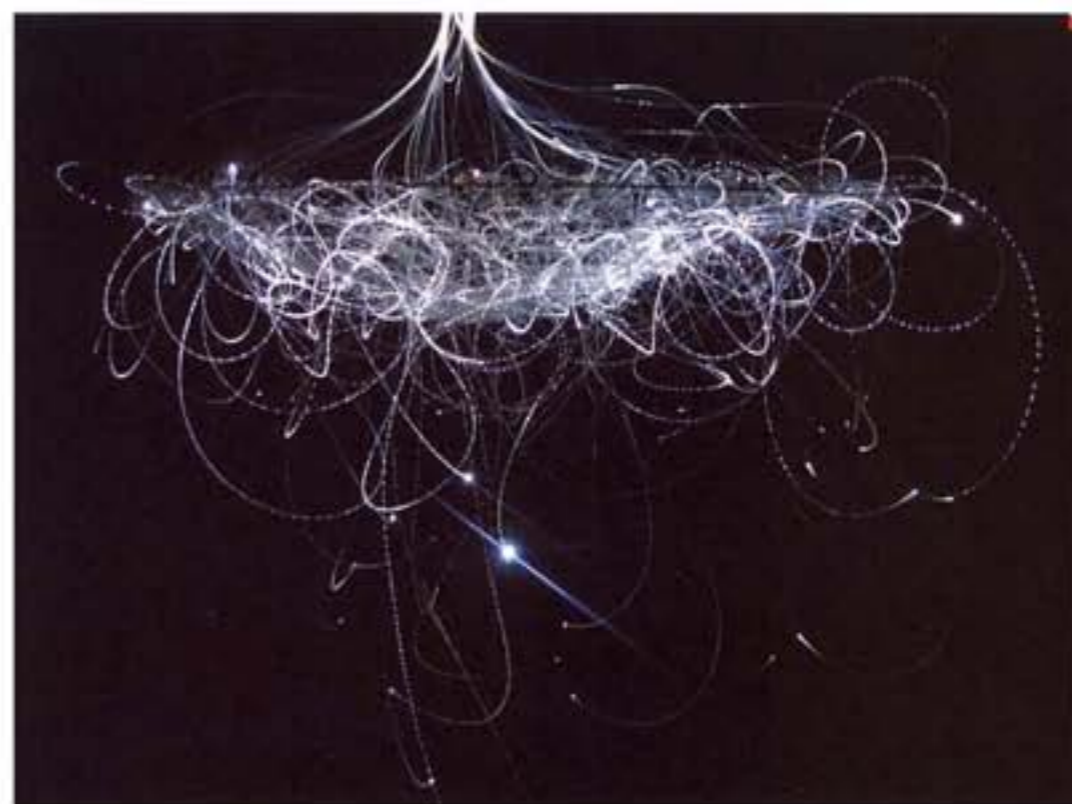
**Squib Pendant**

▶ Go ahead, stroke the Squib. Designed by Brandon Perhacs, the lamp has a merino felt shade that is baby-soft and surprisingly sturdy. Light from the pendant's replaceable 3-watt LED (the equivalent of a 40-watt halogen bulb) also produces bewitching shadows when it escapes through the sleeve's horizontal slits; \$368. **Can Can Pendant**

▶ Clearly, Marcel Wanders likes his dancing girls—at the launch party for his Happy Hour chandelier, his girlfriend served Champagne hanging upside down from the fixture. Can Can is his homage to frisky ladies. Inside the bell-shaped pendant sits a frilly white textile, reminiscent of a twirling petticoat. **Morph Chandelier**

▶ Nature and geometry are the starting points for Wasielewska's wildly sculptural chandeliers. With Morph, she crochets a tangle of fiber-optic cables, hangs them off a fish-wire structure, then trims the optic strands to alter the amount and type of light they emit.
